

January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month

"January 2020 is National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, as decreed by presidential proclamation. January is also known as Human Trafficking Awareness Month. It is a key time for us all as individuals to educate ourselves about human trafficking and crucially to learn to spot the signs of trafficking. It is also a time for us take these messages to our workplaces, our churches, our schools, our representatives and

everywhere else." (Hope for Justice).

<u>What is Human Trafficking?</u> "U.S. law defines human trafficking as the **use of force, fraud, or coercion** to compel a person into commercial sex acts or labor or services against his or her will. The one exception involves minors and commercial sex. Inducing a minor into commercial sex is considered human trafficking regardless of the presence of force, fraud or coercion." (National Human Trafficking Hotline)
